SESSION 1: THE DAC IN A NEW ERA OF SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT (09H30 – 10H45)

MODERATED BY DAC CHAIR CHARLOTTE PETRI GORNITZKA

The new development landscape demands that the DAC rethink its role as well as how it can best support the realisation of commitments recently made across some very important international agreements (Agenda 2030, COP21, Addis Ababa Action Agenda). The evolving landscape has seen new actors emerge and take on greater responsibilities, making it clear that sustainable development is not possible through the actions of governments alone. The DAC has a critical role to play, especially when it comes to shaping the policies and good practice standards, which determine how official development finance is most effectively used. Harnessing these core competencies and adapting them to the evolving landscape will be fundamental. The first session will address how the DAC is planning to do this.

The DAC's work in the context of the Agenda 2030, multi-stakeholder partnerships

The DAC reform process has led to an important reflection that the DAC needs to be more Inclusive, improving its outreach to non-DAC members and non-executive partners (labour, civil society, private sector, parliaments, local governments, etc.). This panel discussion can offer an opportunity to expand on this reflection, bringing the inputs of non-DAC constituents. Following on the conclusions from the previous TU-DAC forums, the discussion will focus on the importance of multi-stakeholders partnerships, such as policy approaches to support the social dialogue for sustainable development. Finally, it will also offer opportunity to provide an update on the evidence-based work undertaken on the role of social dialogue as a means of implementation of agenda 2030.

SESSION 2: THE DAC ROLE IN TRACKING SDGS IMPLEMENTATION (11H15 – 13H00)

MODERATED BY DEPUTY SECRETARY GENERAL, ITUC, WELLINGTON CHIBEBE

In addition to its role as policy setting body, the DAC plays a critical function as a custodian of data and statistical expertise. As the development landscape has changed so too has development finance, in particular, how we track and monitor it. Efforts are also underway at the OECD to revise existing measures and develop a new one to better capture the totality of development finance. An expanded development agenda requires better understanding and tracking of where development finance is being allocated, in order to inform the debate over how best to grow the overall financial flows for development. This session will have a specific focus on the efforts to revamp development finance statistics in the sustainable development era and will also look specifically at how donors allocate and track resources towards a specific international objective, the Decent Work Agenda.

Part I: ODA Modernisation of PSI and the implications

The discussion will highlight the motivation behind ODA Modernisation of Private Sector Instruments and what impact it will have on donor behaviour, in particular on the use of Blended Finance and the role of Development Finance Institutions.

Part II: How do donors support Decent Work and how do they monitor this

This discussion will feature an update on efforts underway to adapt the OECD-DAC Creditor Reporting System to the SDGs. This will be followed by a presentation of new research on how donors support decent work, undertaken by Overseas Development Institute. The report reviews how five DAC donors support and finance the “Decent Work Agenda” and its four pillars (employment creation, rights at work, social protection and social dialogue). The review attempts to track levels of resource allocation and identify gaps.
